

### **2019 Interclub Teams**

Brisbane Zone holds a yearly Teams competition involving the 10 clubs in the Zone, and this year Northern Suburbs was the host club. Each club is entitled to enter a team in the 4 grades, and this year we had 8 teams in A-grade (Open), 10 in B-grade (less than 400 MPs), 10 in C-grade (less than 100 MPs) and 10 in D-grade (less than 10 MPs).

After a good struggle throughout the morning and afternoon, A was won by QCBC, B by Sunnybank, C by Redcliffe and D by Redland, but cumulative over all the 4 grades, Northern Suburbs came out on top.

BBC had teams playing in all 4 grades and everyone enjoyed the day, some especially since it was their first venture into the Congress

arena. Julie Clarke, one of the debutantes, thoroughly enjoyed the first board of match 4, when she was doubled in 4D, making 11 tricks for +910 and 12 Imps.

On board 11 in the second match I sportingly opened 3S with the South hand and John raised to game, to which West led a low club.

When dummy tracked it looked an easy contract, possibly 12 tricks if everything was friendly, as I could pitch my heart on the third club and just lose a diamond.

Don't count your chickens before they hatch! Firstly the spades were 4-0, and then the clubs were 5-1 so I went 1 down after all, thinking I had been unlucky.

At the other table South did not preempt (?) and Peter and John found their heart fit, bidding 5H

over 4S, and who would blame North for doubling?

The reason I went down in 4S was the reason Peter was able to make 12 tricks in 5HX, so he scored +750 and 12 Imps.

On board 31 in the fourth match we got to a tight game, and luckily we had the distribution and trump pips to make it.

John's jump to 3H was showing real support, but only inviting game, and I accepted based on my 2 Aces and good spade.

West led the C3 and I ruffed the 3<sup>rd</sup> club and considered my options. I have good trump pips and good transport, so a cross-ruff looks like a good option, especially if East has 2 spades.

Accordingly I led the DA and ruffed a diamond, then the top spades finishing in hand to ruff another diamond, followed by the 3<sup>rd</sup> spade off the table.

When East follows, I ruff with the HA and ruff my last diamond with the HK to give me my 8<sup>th</sup> trick, and J98 in trumps now guarantees 2 more for +620.

At the other table NS stopped in 3H, just making 9 tricks for -140 and 10 Imps to us.

On board 22 in the seventh match West had a rush of blood and doubled my 1H opening for take-out. Good shape, but lacking points! In my opinion overcalling 1S would have been worse, but only just.

I won the S8 opening lead and led to the HQ, and East won the HA and returned the D2 and to my surprise when I played low West won the DK. Thus I had an easy time after I pitched a diamond on the 3<sup>rd</sup> spade so I could play a heart to hand and play the HT as a safety play, making 10 tricks for +420. This could have been +590 or even +690 as after West's double, East came close to doubling 4H, but prudently kept quiet.

At the other table NS tried for slam and 5H was too high, finishing 1 down for another +50 and 10 Imps.

Double-dummy I could have run the H8 from the table and killed East's trump holding making 11 tricks.
