

Slams


I played in the Gold Coast Teams - the first weekend congress of the Queensland calendar year. Our team triumphed due to getting on the right side of the (dodgy) slam bidding.



Only 2 of the 30 NS pairs found the slam here. The critical bid is the jump rebid of 3D by South. Normally you need 16+ points and a good six card suit. However, I've found with a seven card suit, you generally only need about 13+ points. Essentially the critical thing is that you think the hand has at least 7 tricks (6 diamonds and the A).

Partner felt his hand with good controls and diamond support was enough to try for slam. Roman Keycard Blackwood from partner revealed we were missing one keycard and partner bid slam and fortunately there were no problems in clubs. In the event, I got a spade lead and I was able to discard the *K and a spade on the set up hearts and make all 13 tricks.

This was an unlucky EW slam that 10 out of the 30 pairs were in, including our opponents and our teammates:



It is unlucky not just because of the 5-0 spade break, but because of the lack of texture in spades and the distribution of the high card points. If my partner and I had been bidding it, it would have gone:



West's 2S bid is invitational strength or better and forcing for one round with 4 spades. East's jump to game shows a maximum (16-17) with spade support and is enough for West to check for aces and bid the slam.

The slam has no chance on the trump break but would be in trouble on a good break anyway due to the inevitable heart loser and the lack of texture in the spades making it hard to avoid a loser there as well.

Note that South is right not to double. For all South knows, 6NT might be making and the opponents might run there. Or the double might give the opponents a fatal hint as to how to handle trumps. Best to keep quiet and just let the contract go off.

This final slam was the decisive one in the last round. It was only bid at 7 of the 30 tables but fittingly in a battle between the eventual winners and 3rd place it was bid at both our tables. Sadly and ironically, I brought the slam home on an inferior line while our opponents went down at the other table. I suspect they might have been playing a better line than I but I really didn't want to ask.



I think partner's opening of his hand 1D is reasonable – a good 5 card diamond suit headed by the AK, good controls and one 10 and 2 nines. However, it is definitely pushy.

Partner's 2D bid over 2C in our system is very minimal (12-13) and possibly only 3 diamonds.

My 2C bid followed by the 2H set up a game force, showing the 5 club/4 heart shape. Partner's 4H is a subtle warning he really didn't like his hand that much — in a game force he could have bid 3H showing a stronger hand.

On basic evaluation, my South hand is 16 high card points and 3 for the singleton diamond. However, that singleton is in my partner's probable suit and hence not as valuable as 3 points would suggest. However again, our bidding system left in doubt as to how good those diamonds were in the North hand. The weaker the diamond suit, the more likely partner's points are working in suits helpful to me.

I decided my controls were very good and my heart suit excellent so I pressed on through the red lights.

After agonising, West lead ♠4. You can see his problem – he is leading away from something in every suit and likely to finesse himself in a 6 level contract and promptly did.

Assessing the hand, I dismissed trying to ruff clubs in dummy fairly quickly. You have to get back to hand 3 times either by drawing trumps you need to ruff with, spades which could be ruffed or diamond ruffs which are shortening your own trumps. Too dangerous.

It looked like I had an inevitable trump loser so couldn't afford to lose anything else. With ♠AKJ, ♠AK, ♣A and ♥AK in the bag for 8 tricks, I could get 4 more through little trump cross ruffs. However, an opposition master trump would win one of these tricks so I had to produce another from somewhere.

With 6 diamonds, the opposition diamonds are 4-3 65% of the time, so I could try to ruff the 5th diamond good. If this failed, I could fall back on the spade finesse. It looked like West held this card from the agony at the start and what happened on the first trick but my East

opponent was good enough to duck with the $\triangle Q$.

So it looked like hope for a 3-2 trump break, try diamonds and if that didn't work fall back on the spade finesse. It's probably right to play the trumps first, but I fell back on the adage that you set your suit up before you draw trumps (to allow you to switch to a crossruff if things don't work) and played •AK and ruffed a diamond with pleasing results.

However, when I laid down the ♥A, the ♥J appeared from my left. There is a guide called "restricted choice". Basically if you are missing the QJ of trumps and one falls first round, mathematically it is twice as likely to be singleton than from QJ. I felt ill. I'd shortened my trumps with the diamond ruff (and hence now couldn't catch all 4 from my right) and used

up a critical entry to my hand for some sort of club/diamond cross ruff.

I had no choice now but to lay down the ♥K and hope. And dropped the ♥Q, made the slam and won the congress.

If I'd played ♥A at trick 2 and seen the ♥J, I might have tried a club/diamond cross ruff, fearing the twice as likely bad trump break. It needs ◆AK, ♣A, 2 spades, ♥AK, 3 club ruffs and 2 diamond ruffs. And needs East to have exactly 2 spades, 4 hearts, 3 diamonds and 4 clubs. And goes down on the actual 3-2 trump break.

Who said making a good plan at trick one wins at bridge?
