

Loser on Loser Play 1.

To discard one losing card on another is often an excellent example of declarer play.



South plays in 4S and receives the lead of the ◆K. If East obtains the lead with the ♥K there is the danger of three club losers in addition to the heart loser. Therefore after drawing trumps declarer should play dummy's ◆J (West, from the lead, is presumed to hold the Queen) and discard a losing Heart from hand. He can then establish Heart tricks by taking the ruffing finesse into the safe hand.



Heard at the Bridge Table

Bridge is a great comfort in your old age. It also helps you get there faster.

We had a partnership misunderstanding. My partner assumed I knew what I was doing.

You know you're in trouble when you are the declarer and the opponents start drawing trumps.

The brain is a wonderful organ. It starts working the moment you get up in the morning and does not stop until you sit at the bridge table.
