The No Sex, Drugs or Rock'n'Roll BBC Christmas Party





Bridge hand:



South plays 4H after East has opened the bidding with 1D.

The ◆9 was led by West and declarer embarked on a line of play that relied upon defensive ineptitude to succeed. East played the ◆J at trick one and shifted to a low trump. Declarer won in dummy and naively played the ◆Q. East won

with the King and played another trump. Declarer was now dead in the water - having already lost two top diamonds he still had to lose to a third diamond honour and a spade – 1 down.

To expect to make his tenth trick via a diamond ruff in dummy is to expect his opponents to be not asleep at the wheel, but comatose.

South's line of play could never work and he needed to choose one with at least a chance of success, rather than one doomed to failure. At trick three he should play a low spade from both hands hoping the spades are divided 3-3. If the defenders then lead another round of trumps, South draws trumps and takes •K-A. Dummy's last spade then provides South with his tenth trick.

I might add that counting on defensive ineptitude for success as declarer, is by no means a forlorn hope.
