Bridge hand:

Procrastination (coming from the Latin *cras*, meaning tomorrow) can be a virtue for the good bridge player. Delaying guesses until you have a full picture of the hands is a hallmark of the expert.

West opened the bidding with a 16-18 1NT and N/S subsided in 4H played by South.

West led the ♠A and continued the suit. South ruffed the third spade and hastily drew trumps. He then led a club and played dummy's king on the assumption that West must have the Ace for his 1NT opening. East won, and although the diamond finesse worked for South later, West eventually made the ♣J to defeat the contract. Procrastination here is key. Put off the guess in clubs and finesse in diamonds. The ♠Q holds and declarer plays ♠A and ruffs a diamond. The club position can now be worked out — West has produced 15 high card points (♠A K Q, ♥Q and ♠K J). If West had the ♣A his hand would be too strong to open 1NT, and if he lacked the ♣J, his hand would be too weak.

South thus leads a Club and finesses with dummy's nine. Contract made. Jeez this is an easy game.

God's Dilemma:


Too many bridge players, not enough brains
