The BBC Novice & Restricted Pairs Congress is coming up on Sunday 16 October. The cost is \$70 per pair (\$35 per player). Congress start time is 9:30am and will go to approximately

4:30pm. I encourage all eligible BBC members to enter and play in this congress.

Members entering the Novice section must have fewer than 100 masterpoints and the Under 500 section must have fewer than 500 masterpoints as of 31 July this year. If you are on the edge of either of these cut-offs you can check your masterpoints on the ABF website or ask myself at the office to check for you. The entry form is available at the club or online on the BBC or QBA websites.

To enter please fill out an entry form online on the BBC website or a paper entry at the club. Entries close after Tuesday 11 October at 1:00pm.




Two Interesting Hands from the Brisbane Zone GNOT finals



I was in 3NT from the West hand. North led ♠4, South took ♠K and returned ♠8. My ♠J was taken by North's ♠Q and he carefully switched to ♣10 (if he continues with a spade it gives me the critical trick, along with 2 clubs, 4 diamonds, ♥A and ♥Q finesse).

I played ♣J on the ♣10, South covered with ♣Q and I took ♣A. I crossed to dummy with ♦Q and took the successful ♥Q finesse. I cashed the remaining diamonds, ♥A and ♣K leaving this picture:



♣6 from the East hand now endplayed North (who has no doubt defended this better than most in the room) and he has to give me a spade trick.

This hand was board 18 in match 2 and Lilly and I were playing against David and our humble President! Peter passed as dealer, Lilly also passed and David opened 1H, over which I doubled for take-out. As a passed hand without Heart support, Peter could have pushed the boat out by bidding 2D (not forcing), but instead made the normal bid of 1NT, which was passed out. Lilly does not have a clear-cut opening lead, but mindful that my double would normally have Spades, she led the ♠3. I won the ♠J when dummy played low and we proceeded to cash 4 Spade tricks, ending in my hand, Lilly playing a discouraging Diamond. I then led the ♣Q, won in dummy to take the successful Diamond finesse, but after a successful Heart finesse. Peter was done and finished 2 down for a modest +100 to us. At the other table Eugene rebid 2C over Martin's 1NT and finished in 2H, going 1 down for -50 and 2 Imps to us.

Too many bridge players, not enough brains


Experience: A marvellous thing that enables you to recognise the same mistake you made the last time.
