

Bridge Hand

Bridge text books offer a long list of desirable and recommended opening leads that people read, learn and often use without thought. The flaw in this approach is obvious: a list cannot sit at the table to listen to the bidding, visualize the course of play and pick the best lead to counter declarer's plans.

Take this deal:



South opened the bidding with 1C, North bid 1H, South bid 1S which was optimistically raised to game by North.

West knew all the opening leads and started with the top card in his Heart sequence against South's game. South took full advantage of this thoughtless lead. He threw a diamond on the A♥, ruffed a Heart, cashed the A♣ and ruffed a Club. Next came a Heart ruff, a club ruff and another Heart ruff. South then took the two top Diamonds and ruffed a Diamond for his tenth trick. East looked forlornly at his A K Q of trumps.

West should have thought of the bidding: he has clubs and hearts under control and nobody has bid Diamonds. Ten tricks can likely only come via trumps and West should lead a trump and punish North for his overbidding. If East is allowed to cash his trumps on the first three tricks, South must play carefully to take even eight tricks.

I acknowledge that bridge is a timed event, that slow play attracts penalty and lessens enjoyment for other players. I commit to keeping my delays within bounds. I acknowledge that bridge is a counting game. I commit to Always Being Counting. I can rest when I am dummy.

I promote sportsmanship as an important part of it. I am grateful for my partner who is striving toward the same ends as I am. I respect that my opponents are doing likewise. I aim to be courteous and to contribute to the game's enjoyment by others.
