

Note: Small tea break will be held during each session. For the Wednesday and Thursday events, you must play both the morning and afternoon sessions.

- (1) Note the aggressive pre-empt from West. When you are non-vul vs vul, you can usually pre-empt to within 4 tricks of your contract.

Here, the West hand will probably get 5 tricks with diamonds as trumps so you can pre-empt with 3D. Note this is 3 down for -500 against a -620 4S game by NS.

- (2) North's double is a negative double showing 4 hearts and 10+ points

4S by South – opening lead ♥J.

This was an ordinary hand played at club level a couple of weeks ago but not played terribly well. You should follow this general process as declarer **BEFORE YOU TOUCH A CARD**:

(1) COUNT YOUR LOSERS IN A SUIT CONTRACT

This is to give you an idea of where your main problem is and to get you to start thinking about how to get rid of as many losers as possible. Looking at the South hand, you have no club losers, 3 diamond losers (this is where the problem is!), no heart losers, and no trump losers if they break well. However, with a pre-empt from West, I would be concerned that there might be a bad trump break. When one hand shows up with a lot of cards in one suit,

there is less room for cards in other suits and this increases the chances of bad breaks in other suits.

So, summing up it looks like we have 3 diamond losers we would like to get rid of, with the danger of a bad trump break for another loser or two.

(2) DECIDE ON YOUR GENERAL PLAN

There are only a small number of general plans but it's very important you have one. Even if you later get the small details wrong or mistime things, you know the general path you should be on and might be able to scramble back to where you should be.

The 4 main general plans are:

- (a) Draw trumps straight away and then take any finesses and test suits to see if they break.
- (b) Ruff some losers away in dummy before drawing trumps
- (c) Set up a long suit to discard losers. You might be drawing trumps first or not.
- (d) Cross ruff. You never draw trumps but ruff back and forth between hands

On this hand, you could try to ruff a diamond in dummy but this clearly will fail. With the diamond pre-empt on your left, your right hand opponent will clearly be able to over ruff you. Never mind the fact you have to lose 2 diamond tricks first and your opponents can lead trumps to counteract your plan.

My eye would fall upon the club suit in dummy – this looks like a set the long suit up for discards type general plan.

(3) DECIDE ON THE SPECIFIC DETAILS – PARTICULARLY WHEN YOU SHOULD DRAW TRUMPS

There's no point in delaying drawing trumps on this hand – you don't intend to ruff anything in dummy and trumps don't provide you with an entry back to dummy to get at the clubs. However, there is a danger – your diamond losers are very exposed so you must ensure you don't lose any more tricks.

How should we play to set up the club suit? On this hand, East is likely to show up with more clubs. West's pre-empt means East has very few diamonds and is likely to be longer in the other suits in compensation. Hence (after drawing trumps which do break nicely), I would play ♣AK and if the ♣Q hasn't appeared, lead the ♣J. If it's not covered, throw a diamond away. If West has the ♣Q against the odds, I still only lose 3 diamonds and make my contract. If East has the ♣Q (which is the case here) you will be able to get 2 discards on set up clubs.

Did I say you will be able to get 2 discards on set up clubs? That does assume you won the first trick with the ♥K in hand and still have the ♥A to get back to your clubs. And that's why you go through this planning process before you touch a card in dummy.
