B Grade Bidding Woes

The following set of North South cards arose when I was playing a game of 'no friends Nigel' on BBO recently – me, three robots and a bottle of Shiraz. East West didn't have any shortages so 7D is cold: draw trumps, cash winners and cross ruff. But playing Standard, how do you get there?

North:

♠ K Q x

♥ A x x

♦ Q x x x x

♣ A x

South:

♠ A 10 xx

♥ Q

♦ A K x x x

♣ K x x

Dealer: South

Despite having 16 points, South can't open 1NT with the singleton QH. Well, John Kelly might, but for us mere mortals, 1D is likely to be the common opening bid. EW remain silent. If, like my partner, you subscribe to the BFT system (blunt force trauma), then North might bid 3NT. But that shuts down any progress, because it can be bid with 12-14 points and no 4-card major, and hides the excellent diamond fit. South would likely pass.

The more sophisticated among you might

employ inverted minor, with North bidding 2D to keep the auction going. At this point, opener can bid 2S, which is not a reverse, so North would likely again bid 3NT. Would South take North's jump to 3NT to show a strong hand? It only needs opening hand opposite opening hand.

If they did, South could bid 4D confirming the fit and looking for slam. But a poor outcome is getting stuck in 5D, which is a risk when leaving 3NT to look for a minor slam. In this case, assuming you understand each other and don't stop in 4D – it happens - then RKC would get you to the terrific slam.

If your system allows South to jump to 3S over inverted minor to show 15+, even with a fourcard suit, then North would know about the strong hand, the good diamond fit and could take action. But is that a less likely auction?

Ok, I can hear the Precision players insisting that their strong 1C opening would solve the problem. Maybe in this instance, I say grudgingly. The board is one of those strange ones, where Standard is a little hampered because the fit is in a minor. Swap the diamonds and hearts in each hand, and you'd get to a heart slam with consummate ease.

Oh, what to do? Perhaps I should switch to Merlot!

When there is a Novice event on, such as you had on Sunday 27th, if you let me know, I can in turn send that information out to all the novices that want to have that information, because they have asked me to add them to my email list.

There are two great benefits. First, clubs get their novice event individually emailed to over 100 novices already on my list. Second all the novices on my email list get information about coming events that they may not have known about any other way.
