Please arrive by 6:45pm each afternoon. No prior entry is required; everyone plays in the red point sessions. To qualify for the combined sessions overall placing result, you need to play both weeks with the same partner. The cost will be \$7 or a coupon for members and \$9 for visitors.

BBC Under 500 & Novice Pairs Congress (Sunday, 29 October, 9:30am)

The BBC Novice & Restricted Pairs Congress is coming up on Sunday 29 October. The cost is \$60 per pair (\$30 per player). Congress start time is 9:30am and ends approximately 4:30pm. I encourage all BBC members with under 500 masterpoints and especially those with under 100 for the novice section to enter and play in this congress.

Members entering the congress must have fewer than 500 masterpoints as of 31 July this year. If you are on the edge of either of these cut-offs you can check your masterpoints on the ABF website or ask myself at the office to check for you. The entry form is available at the club or online on the BBC and QBA websites. To enter, please email the club at bbcentries@gmail.com or fill out a paper entry at the club. Entries close after Tuesday 24 October at 1:00pm.

Friendly Reminders

Please remember to clean your table after play. Crumbs left on tables will attract ants, rats and cockroaches. Cups and glasses go to the kitchen and into the appropriate dishwasher. Leaving your table neat and tidy makes it inviting to the players sitting at that table at the next session and saves work for directors.

Arriving Without a Partner

Currently BBC offers two sessions in which you may turn up without a partner: The Thursday Morning Supervised session and the Saturday

Afternoon session. (If our regular Saturday afternoon director, Neil Hansen, is away on any Saturday, this may not apply – if you are planning to arrive without a partner on Saturday, please check beforehand if Neil is directing, or if some other arrangement can be made for you).

If you are a player who arrives without a partner please be mindful that the following policy applies:

- · Players arriving without a partner must arrive at least 15 minutes before the scheduled start time for the session.
- · Players arriving without a partner must be prepared and willing to play with any other

player who arrives without a partner.

· Players arriving without a partner should be mindful of Law 74. They should avoid any action or remark that may cause embarrassment to another player or interfere with their enjoyment of the game.

Bridge Hand: A Simple Solution

Vul: Nil Dlr: East


Opening lead: 2H. Plan the play.

On the lead of the 2 of hearts – if your first impulse if your first impulse is to ruff in dummy, forget that, and discard a diamond from dummy at trick 1. Assuming East wins the trick with the AV and returns a diamond, go up with the AV, draw trumps and discard dummy's remaining diamond on the KV.

This simple loser on loser play is the only way to guarantee your slam contract.

As declarer it is always vital to think carefully about the play to the first trick. Many contracts fail due to hasty play at trick 1, and don't I know it.

Sometimes I wake up grumpy: other times I let her sleep.


